Welcome to the start of the Academic year 2015-16. During our first month we have been incredibly busy. Year 7s have settled in well with 100% of parents showing that they are happy with the transition to our school at the recent 'Meet the Tutor' evening. We have an excellent track record in supporting the transition from primary to secondary education and this had been even stronger this year. Thanks to Miss Collie and the Transition team. Open Evening for Year 6 parents was very well attended, comments were very complimentary about our students, staff and facilities.

I am sure you are all aware of the fantastic improvement in results both at GCSE and A Level in August 2015, and inside the Bulletin details our key results for you to look at. We are proud of the progress made especially the fact that Maths and English progress and attainment measures are higher than National. Our Sixth Form results demonstrated similar level of improvement as A*-B A Level grades improved by 15% as did D*-D results in vocational courses. I also believe the incredible improvement in Science results is worthy of a mention here too! The Science team worked relentlessly to improve pupil outcomes and I am very proud to be able to say that the percentage of 2 good (Ebacc) Sciences increased by 28% to 63%. The progress made in Science is truly outstanding.

Our improvement in pupil results remains a key focus for the school as we strive to deliver the very best for every child. However, it is a huge focus as well at the school on

how well we support and promote the development of the 'whole child'. This had been evident in the first month with Year 9 buddy support for Year 7's, Sky Sports television interview with our students, filming for the British Heart Foundation as three of our students become the face of their campaign launching this month, and also the launch of our charity work supporting the development of a school in Burma to provide an education for children who are less privileged than ourselves.

I am truly proud of the achievements, attitudes and commitment of our students and I hope you read through our more regular Bulletins this year to gain a great understanding of the wonderful work and opportunities we deliver within our school.

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Key School Results – good news all round

A round up of GCSE and A Level results for 2015:

- The school has seen a 9% increase in students achieving 5 or more GCSE grades A*-C including English and Maths
- 68% of students achieving A*-C grades in Maths
- 75% of students achieving A*-C grades in English
- Progress made by students in English and Maths is higher than National
- 21% increase in students achieving 2 Ebacc A*-C grades in Science
- Single Sciences A*-C grades in line with National – Biology 90%, Chemistry 93% and Physics 93%
- A*-B grades at A Level went up by 15%
- D*-D (Level 3) in BTEC went up by 8%
- Highest number of university placements in the school's history (61%)
- 2015 Year 7 student intake is up by 13% – Student Admission Number is 180 – we are oversubscribed in Year 7

United World Schools – helping children in Burma

Tim Howarth, Chief Operating Officer of United World Schools (UWS) visited the school last week to talk about the work they undertake. UWS provide education for children in developing and war-torn regions of the world.

Mr Howarth, a teacher by trade, has worked in and around education for 13 years. He talked about the new partnership The Buckingham School now has with UWS, highlighting the work they do, specifically in Burma, where we as a school will help provide education to children there. Mr Howarth spoke about ways to support this important project and presented a number of real life examples from Burma. We look forward to learning about how The Buckingham School can help support children in Burma and giving them an education they rightly deserve.

New 3D Printer & Year 8 Entrepreneurs

This term the school has invested in a new and exciting piece of kit. It's called a 3D printer. It builds models up layer by layer and can produce some very intricate parts. Also slow to work it can produce models in much quicker time than it would take to traditionally model it by hand. You have probably heard of 3D printers before as they are becoming very popular for small kick-starter businesses. The practical uses for 3D printers are being realized by more and more industries and since being created in 1983 they really have revolutionized the way things are being made. 3D printers can build whole new biological parts:- new organs for transplant and in China the same process has been scaled up to actually print in concrete and to build actual houses! This quick rate of producing something gives this type of manufacture the name of: rapid production or rapid modelling. A group of Year 8 students who have at break-time and lunchtimes been totally inspired by the technology and have started their own entrepreneurial company called "3D Quick Prints". (Look out Lord Sugar!) They even have designated roles for them all to do (such as designer, painter, seller etc). They will create models upon request for a small fee. 3D Quick Prints are trained and able

to use the 3D printer so for the cost of £3 they will print models for you. The £3 will cover the cost of the material used (£2) but these young boys have also decided to selflessly donate all of their profit to charity. **They will collect £1 from every print to give to MacMillan (Cancer Research Charity).**

Shown here are pictures of the products 3D Quick Prints will be selling upon request. A dinosaur, a pencil grip and a rocket-ship pencil topper. Each are available in a range of colours, all for £3. Any orders can be placed in 8FA form folder and you will be informed when the model has been printed so you can come and collect/pay. Year 11 GCSE Geography Field Trip to The River Chess

Year 11 Geography students visited The River Chess to collect fieldwork data for their Controlled Assessment. The aim of the day was to see if the river fits the Bradshaw Model, which suggests that river width, depth, velocity and discharge increases downstream. Students visited their first site at Scotsbridge Mill, near Rickmansworth and took a series of measurements in the river, using tape measures, metre rulers and hydro propellers. They also learned how to do field sketches. In the afternoon, after lunch along the banks of the river, students repeated these measurements at a second site at Chesham Moor and started to make comparisons. They will now present the data they have found and begin to analyse it in class to see to what extent the River Chess fits the model. The visit was a huge success, mostly due to the impeccable behaviour of the students and the dry, sunny conditions on the day. For many of the students it was the first time they had worn a pair of

wellies, let alone take measurements in a river, so it was refreshing to see them out of their comfort zone. They were all willing to participate and get involved and I hope that this has inspired them to investigate their surroundings more often. A special well done to Alex Forward and Iris Hampton in Year 10, who also participated in preparation for their own fieldwork in the summer term.

Joint Partnership working with the Primary Schools:

Over the past year The Buckingham School and all the feeder primary schools in the area have been working together on improving literacy. Some of this work has included: sharing good practice on all areas of literacy from different schools; enrichment days for Year 5 and 6 students at The Buckingham School, bespoke performing arts packages for some primary schools, shared writing and also joint moderation of Key Stage 2 and Key Stage 1 writing to ensure even greater consistency in marking. These events have been well attended but this year we hope to have all of the primary schools involved at every meeting so we are all learning from each other.

The up and coming challenge for us this year is in securing an even smoother transition from Key Stage 2 to 3 now that Levels have gone. We can only hope to achieve this through our unique and important work with the primary schools and this will help to ensure that all the children who come to us make outstanding progress from their very first lesson at secondary school.

These students made great progress and worked really hard in the exams and the whole English department is incredibly proud of them.

Excellent Attendance = Excellent Achievement

We recently sent out a letter regarding the link between attendance and attainment – as it is such an important matter, we have taken the opportunity to again, summarise the facts.

We believe every child should have the best possible opportunity to achieve their full potential and make excellent progress. To develop and increase each student's progress, we encourage them to understand the importance of good attendance and how regular attendance directly relates to positive attainment and exam success. Last year's attendance for Year 11 and GCSE attainment statistics have been analysed.

The key findings are:

- 71% of students with 100% attendance achieved 5 A*-C grades including English and Maths
- 65% of students with 95% or better attendance achieved 5 A*-C grades including English and Maths
- Only 40% students whose attendance was 94.9% - 90% achieved 5 A*-C including English and Maths.
- Only 30% of students below 89.9% achieved 5A*-C including English and Maths

As the statistics show, students who attended more frequently have an increased chance of performing to their best and increasing the range of options available to them Post 16. As a school, we continue to encourage all our students to aim for 96% attendance over the school year and emphasise the link between attendance and achievement. We value our partnership with parents/carers and believe that strong communication between school and home will help to raise attendance and improve standards.
